

Iran Walks Out During Plenary

The first plenary opened with optimistic, if guarded, words from the delegations present, with hope for successful negotiations across the board, yet tensions were heightened by the Republic of Iran, both in word and act.



Iran opened their speech demanding a lift of all sanctions currently in place, the fulfillment of which would compel the Republic to open up its doors to IAEA inspectors.

The Iranian delegation took a firm stance against the "terrorist state" that is Israel, maintaining that they "do not negotiate with terrorists". They furthermore seek a future wherein the Zionist oppressors are "wiped from the face of the earth."

In an act that offended some and induced tears from others, the Iranian delegation one-upped their own act of sartorial dissent by exiting the plenary as soon as the chair of the Israeli Delegation reached the podium.

To Iran's claim that Israel is a terrorist state, delegation chair Kirin Kachroo-Levine responded with only, "They're one to talk." Pakistan and the Democratic People's Republic of Korea were the most outspoken advocates in support of Iran, with the chair of the DPRK calling for international cooperation with the Islamic Republic lest "a blow to Iran" leads to "nuclear holocaust."

The delegations from Western Europe attempted to cast themselves in the role of arbitrators, with France hoping to act as "mediator between east and west powers."

The Japanese delegation closed out the plenary with a refreshing dismissal of the importance of military capability, stressing instead economic strength and diplomatic viability.

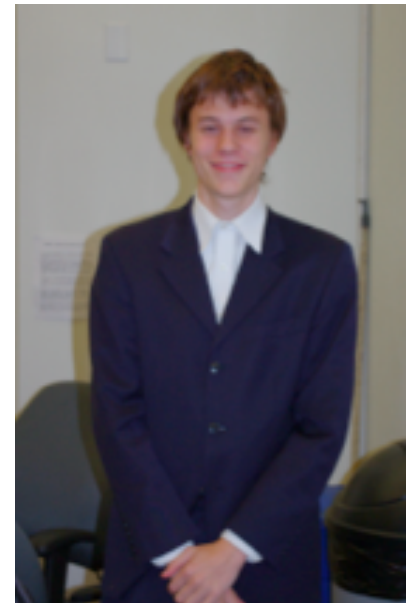
