

To the Iranian Delegation:

The Supreme Leader of the Islamic Republic of Iran presents his best wishes to the Delegation and urges all members of the Delegation to consistently carry out the will of God. We will, Allah willing, use this conference to protect our sovereign right to produce nuclear materials for peaceful purposes and increase our opportunities to develop weapons if necessary to enhance our security in the future.

Accordingly the Delegation should:

1. Deny point by point any charges of NPT violations or infractions or of the related Safeguard agreements. Iran's failure to report a peaceful nuclear energy program involving activities such as uranium enrichment was a minor technical oversight that has been corrected. Iran will vehemently deny that it has, or aspires to have, a nuclear weapons program. With the greatest vigor, state that Iran will withdraw from the NPT at the slightest hint of sanctions! (Well, any further sanctions).
2. Vigorously persuade the conference that the US has not kept its side of the NPT and now threatens all peace-loving states. Warn participants that US military threats are tantamount to playing with fire. All states thus threatened have a right to defend themselves in any way possible if threatened with attack. Be careful to be tough but defensive in manner. Also call attention to the brutal American imperialism in the Iranian Gulf, and their establishment of puppet regimes in Iraq and Afghanistan.
3. At the same time, secretly seek nuclear weapon technology of any kind from whoever will supply it. You can offer them long term energy supply commitments in return. It seems to me that our brethren in Pakistan might be particularly willing to help us out.
4. Demand that Zionists in Israel give up Nuclear Weapons immediately! Predict in your opening speech that the Zionist regime will one day disappear from the face of the earth.
5. Strive for the best possible economic and military relationship with Russia and China. Offer trade concessions to the French and British in exchange for their help in keeping the current interpretation of the NPT (allowing for uranium enrichment and plutonium reprocessing) and assistance with nuclear reactors in the future. Inform India that if it sides with the US against Iran, we will terminate our many energy relationships with India.
6. Do not publicly support the DPRK, but privately show our sympathy and seek improved missiles from them. Offer the DPRK \$250 million for each operational nuclear weapon they sell us. Make sure that you are not caught in this transaction. If you are caught, you are expected to take personal and full responsibility for this transaction.
7. The Zionist Entity is represented at this conference. Walk out when they give their opening speech. Demand that they leave, as they are an illegal entity that has acquired weapons of mass destruction. Make a motion to kick them out of the conference.
8. Let all of the delegations know that you are planning on spreading peaceful nuclear technology (for what other kind could there be coming from Iran?) to other states. Tell them that you intend to let a thousand (nuclear) flowers bloom.

To the Pakistani delegation,

Dear delegates: The following days offer multiple opportunities for achieving the goals to strengthen our proud country and thwart the efforts of our opponents in the East. My instructions to you:

1. Demand that the criminal regime in India dismantle its nuclear arsenals completely. Obviously, on no account can India be admitted to the NPT (unless it does so as a state free of nuclear weapons) nor should India be admitted as a permanent member of the Security Council, a position they have been aspiring to for decades.
2. Obviously, our own nuclear program, initiated in response to India's program and India's aggressions, cannot be affected by these negotiations. We will not give up a single atom of plutonium or uranium, unless of course we are selling them for a profitable price so we can make more.
3. The issue of Kashmir is of prime importance to our country and our identity as a Muslim state. Seek the inclusion in any agreements a clause requiring a referendum in Kashmir and the withdrawal of Indian occupation forces from the region.
4. Support the U.S. in any measure against Iran. But do so carefully: we do not wish to alienate our Muslim brethren in neighboring countries or the population in our own country. At the same time, seek to strengthen ties with powerful European states.
5. It is best for us to remain aloof in our relationship with Iran. Be suspicious and cautious and refuse, politely, any unnecessary contact. At the same time, use the Shi'a members of your delegation to secretly acquire a contact inside the Iranian delegation to do your bidding, supply you with information and disseminate confusing counter-information within the Iranian delegation. A decent bribe should do the job. Use your imagination. You could then use this information to gain concessions from Iran's powerful enemies.
6. Suspect any overtures from Israel, a state that has never shown kindness to Islam. But do not preclude the option of secret ties with such states, depending on what you think you might gain from such ties.

To the Delegation of the People's Republic of China:

Greetings to the Delegation that will represent our ancient land in the forthcoming negotiations on nuclear nonproliferation. Study the principles of warfare set down by the great philosopher Sun Tzu; this negotiation is merely war in another form. The Delegation should be guided by the following principles:

1. It is important to maintain balance in our diplomacy. We have supported three rounds of sanctions against Iran. The Americans, however, should not be allowed to infringe on Iranian sovereignty. Publicly threaten to veto increased sanctions. Remind the Americans that Chinese support is essential to Iranian cooperation, just as it was critical to the Six Party Talks.
2. To maximize leverage, in private discussions with Iran, appear to be wavering on the issue of sanctions. Suggest we might allow sanctions if Iran acts against our interests.
3. Combined with threat of not vetoing sanctions, secretly offer Iran access to nuclear technology in exchange for secure long-term oil and gas contracts. Funnel the technology through the DPRK if necessary.
4. If pressed by the Americans on sanctions, point out to the Americans that China now holds \$1 trillion in US debt securities. Note that any attempt to punish Chinese businesses that conduct transactions with Iran will result in severe financial repercussions.
5. India should keep its hands off Pakistan and should be informed that any attempts to restrain Pakistan's nuclear program would lead to Chinese tactical nuclear weapons on India's northern border to replace the Pakistani indigenous deterrent.
6. The Delegation should work closely with the DPRK. They should be encouraged to continue the process of nuclear disarmament. However, we are indifferent to North Korea's distribution of peaceful nuclear technology.
7. Highlight China's great achievements in supporting the nonproliferation regime, including our joining the Nuclear Suppliers Group.
8. Reject expansion of the Security Council beyond its current membership. There is no reason why any additional states should be added, especially India. Veto any proposals.

To the Delegation of the Russian Federation:

I am completely confident that the Delegation will uphold our interests as a great power and a nuclear weapons state in the forthcoming negotiations. We have vital economic and security interests at stake in the Middle East that must be upheld at all costs.

The following is a list of the Russian Federation's primary objectives for these negotiations:

1. The continuation of a profitable relationship with Iran. Negotiate with the Iranians to pre-order and make down deposits for further reactors. Suggest that the reactor we have just finished building for them may come to harm if they do not. Offer increased support, proportional to the amount they are willing to pay for them. 1000MW Reactors are \$1bn each; a 10% deposit would be most helpful.
2. Be very vague in our support of sanctions. Suggest to both sides that support depends on side payments. Suggest to the US that our support could be bought if they were to compensate us for any loss of reactor sales to Iran. And if they cancel their Prompt Global Strike plans. And if they provide guarantees not to expand NATO to Ukraine. And if they recognize Abkhazia and South Ossetia. Demand exclusive natural gas contracts from the Europeans. Suggest that a veto in the Security Council may occur if our limited and reasonable demands are not met.
3. Make an offer to Iran to do a joint uranium enrichment program on Iranian soil. They offered it to the French, why not us?
4. Try to keep the UK and France closer to our position than the US's position at all times. Remind the French that we are a natural counterweight to the US's hegemonic ambitions.
5. Position yourselves as the natural third party in the negotiations. Don't let the Europeans pretend that they're the only ones who can moderate.
6. Seek new military contracts with India and Pakistan. Offer assistance with their ballistic missile programs in exchange for hard currency.
7. To help "re-energize" the North Korean nuclear situation, offer the North Koreans light water reactors. Suggest to the US that Russian-made reactors are the ideal way to fulfill our joint commitments to foster energy cooperation with the DPRK.

To the British Delegation:

Her majesty wishes the Delegation well in the forthcoming negotiations on nuclear nonproliferation. In spite of what appear to be mounting costs from our trans-Atlantic alliance, the US remains the most trusted partner among our formal colonial possessions. Our goal in these negotiations is to support the US as far as possible while at the same time bolstering the NPT as far as possible.

The Delegation should be guided by the following principles, and make its position clear in the opening statement:

1. The UK should support, in conjunction with the Americans, a strong hand against North Korea, and Iran. The UK should stand by the US in unflinching support for Israel. The Americans should be made aware that this support is not without domestic cost for us – particularly in view of the ongoing situation in Iraq, the intransigence of the Israeli government, and calls from our own party to deny the United States political and logistical support in the event of a military strike on Iran. You should try to subtly nudge the Americans toward Comprehensive Test Ban Treaty (CTBT) ratification and legally binding security assurances for Iran in return for our support. You should also express your disdain to your American counterpart, in private of course, regarding America's development of a new generation of nuclear weapons.
2. We demand French and Chinese nuclear reductions to our level. We might support them on some things – that didn't bring us into conflict with the US – to achieve this. And we should be sympathetic to the Russians in Iran, even if the Americans don't like it.
3. At the same time, it is important to maintain our nuclear arms at current level. We have the lowest number of the Five and we should not go lower.
4. The UK needs to strengthen its relations with the Muslim world to the extent possible. We should not, however, permit any of these young and inexperienced nuclear states to join the NPT as nuclear states. Unlike ourselves, the Chinese, Russians and Americans, they did not achieve this status by earning the respect of the international community and cannot be trusted, at their current stage of development, to handle the burden conferred by a formal nuclear status.
5. Iran is currently pissed at the UK for paying 'terrorists' and 'assassins' that have been arrested in Iran. This is false and must be denied. UK/Iran relations have long been strained by what Iran describes as subterfuge or worse—try to reassure them publically in vague terms that the UK is interested in nothing but peaceful relations with Iran and the rest of the world. Say lots of supportive things about Islam, remind them that the UK is not the "Great Satan."

To the Israeli Delegation:

A firm salute to you all as you begin your representation of our land in what will be a most difficult diplomatic conference. Keep in mind that we have only one real friend at the conference, the USA, and you should support the USA whenever you can. Also, you may be able to find common cause with those who see the same threat in Islam as we do, as does India. The Delegation should be guided by the following principles, and make its position clear in the opening statement:

1. Now that the greatest threat to peace in the Middle East has been efficiently addressed by our friends in the White House, Iran has risen to the head of our agenda. Loudly and angrily protest threats made to us by Iran's lunatic leadership. Call on the states present to recognize Iran's blatant breach of its NPT commitments. Seek to undermine Iranian ambitions by any means possible. Be particularly assertive and creative in coming up with ways to stop Iran's nuclear program. Iran can under no circumstances be allowed to develop even the capacity to build nuclear weapons. Drop hints that Israel will take any and all measures necessary to prevent this from occurring.
  - a. Walk out if anyone from Iran attempts to deny the Holocaust, or deny Israel's right to exist.
2. Make no mention whatsoever of our alleged nuclear program. As usual, state publicly that Israel "will not be first in the region to acquire or use weapons of mass destruction."
3. In private, express to the US concern that North Korea continues to spread nuclear material and information to Syria and Iran. Ask the United States to provide assurances that North Korea's nuclear proliferation will desist.
4. State publicly that ballistic missile defense technology offers a path toward a more secure world. Our scientists are continuing with freedom-loving scientists around the world to find a way down this path. Privately, seek sales of our technology to India and China among others.
5. Israel, however, can discuss in principle a nuclear weapon free zone for the Middle East, but it would only happen after a full and comprehensive peace is achieved and there is a verifiable elimination of weapons of mass destruction through out the Islamic world, to include Iran and Pakistan.
6. You should support India in strong measures to restrain the Pakistani nuclear program and especially to ensure it doesn't spread to other countries. We can offer India whatever military technology they would like to buy. This should not, however, come at the cost of permitting India to join the NPT as a nuclear state. Use our American allies to ensure that the nuclear club does not expand.
7. We have good reason to worry about the intention of our neighbors, especially the more industrially advanced among them, irrespective of the formal peace status that may or may not characterize our relations. The elimination of the NPT escape clause would be an excellent way to prevent any surprises on this front.

To the Delegation from the Democratic People's Republic of Korea:

I have full confidence in the Delegation to successfully safeguard our homeland in the forthcoming negotiations consistent with the spirit of Juche. The following are instructions for the Delegation.

1. Publicly support the Iranians. Denounce the US and other powers for restricting the rights of sovereign nations to develop peaceful nuclear technology. Seek solidarity with the Iranians; a blow against them is a blow against all of us, and will lead to a nuclear holocaust.
2. Privately offer the Iranians assistance with uranium conversion technology in exchange for secure energy supplies. Offer them one bomb's worth (5 kg) of plutonium for 'research purposes' and see how much they are willing to pay for it.
3. Attempt to create rifts between the great powers so that we can stay in good relations with our brothers to the south and our Chinese friends.
4. Confuse the Americans. Some of you (those in the foreign ministry) privately say to them that we will never sell nuclear technology to other states and that we are on track to disabling our nuclear facilities. Others (affiliated with the intelligence ministry) tell the Americans privately that we will never surrender our weapons and that we have the right to sell any technology to anyone we please.
5. Tell the conference that we were forced to develop a deterrent because of the rogue Bush regime; we are fighting against the empire of the devil. We still have reason to fear American imperialism and aggression in the region and we interpret any talk of a missile defense system in East Asia as an act of aggression meant to undermine our sovereignty.
6. Privately offer renewed ballistic missile cooperation to Pakistan in exchange for their diplomatic support at the conference and technical support for our uranium enrichment program.
7. Seek economic trade benefits from Russia and the Europeans. I will visit them someday soon. Disdain the Brits as "Little Satan," but seek economic aid from them, if possible.
8. Announce that if any additional sanctions are levied against Iran that the DPRK will not rejoin the discriminatory NPT or agree to the return of IAEA inspectors or any other inspectors. They were spies for the US.
9. Be diplomatic and gentle with the Chinese, but don't agree to anything they say. Privately threaten a refugee crisis if they put pressure on us.
10. Be forceful in speeches. Create fear of our strength and determination. Demand deference, and Hennessy. Divide our enemies and create new friends in this time of great need. And, most importantly, pay homage to me in every speech that you make, as well as my son and successor, Kim Jong-Un. I have spies at the conference that will report back if you deviate from these instructions

To the French Delegation:

I have full confidence in the Delegation to not only uphold France's international reputation as a great power but to further its significant interests in the international system. My instructions follow.

1. Given Iranian security agents' egregious mistreatment of French diplomatic personnel this week, your attitude toward them should be appropriately cool and distant. An apology from the Iranian delegation is a precondition for French negotiations with them.
2. The Delegation should always be alert to protect France's significant commercial interests with respect to all states. Make side deals where they are profitable and do not otherwise contradict French policy.
3. Oppose all military threats against Iran, particularly by Israel. Encourage all parties to work toward a diplomatic solution, which may include further strengthening of sanctions.
4. The NPT should not be bent to include additional states such as North Korea, Pakistan and India as nuclear weapons states. Oppose any such efforts.
5. Oppose US efforts to supply India with nuclear technology, unless France can be guaranteed significant commercial benefits, in which case France should undercut US offers of nuclear technology with superior French technology.
6. As a part of a deal with Iran to stop uranium enrichment permanently, offer superb financing on French reactors. Try to undercut the Russians.
7. Try to convince the Iranians to back the plan to send their LEU to Russia (and from there to France) to create fuel rods for the Tehran Research Reactor. Offer private side payments.

To the Delegation of India:

My compliments to the Delegation. I ask the Delegation always to keep in mind the principal and long-standing enemy of Vishnu, militant Islam. The government of India decries the apartheid treaty regime of the NPT where 182 nations are denied the political rights that five states granted to themselves.

With that in mind your primary objectives in the negotiations should be:

1. The elimination of the criminal Pakistani nuclear weapon program, which is for sale to terrorists. Also extract promises from Pakistan's suppliers, North Korea and Russia, that they will cease any aid to Pakistan. Since *any* Muslim bomb is a potential threat to us, Iran must be disarmed as well.
2. Demand that India be accepted into the NPT as a nuclear weapon state. Do what you need to do in order to convince the N-5 to let you join the nuclear club. At the same time, try to garner votes for an informal letter, signed by as many states as you can, confirming their support for a permanent Security Council seat for us. We are one of the largest and most populous states on earth and deserve to be represented accordingly.
3. To achieve pressure on Pakistan, our best potential ally is likely to be Israel. Use this negotiation to solidify the emerging strategic alliance between two of the world's great democracies: Israel and India.
4. The second largest threat to our security comes not from Pakistan in the west but from Pakistan's chief ally, China, in the East. Inform the Chinese that, unless they scale back their nuclear forces, India might conclude a defense agreement with Taiwan.
5. The issue of Kashmir is the primary stumbling block to negotiations between Pakistan and ourselves. But we will not discuss this issue before there is a full disarmament of Pakistan. The Pakistanis will demand a referendum for Kashmir, which is a ridiculous proposition. Besides, this topic is of no relevance to nuclear negotiations.
6. Inform the Iranians that if they leave the NPT they can count on very substantial Indian military assistance if they are willing to join an Anti-Pakistan alliance with India against the Sunni terrorists. Support no actions that would threaten to cut off Iran's valuable petroleum exports to our country.
7. Seek to expand our program in missile technology with the assistance of Russia; we will support them in Chechnya to achieve this.

To the Delegation of the United States of America:

As you well know, you are representing the United States of America, the world's greatest and most powerful democracy. You will do whatever is necessary to protect the American people, support our allies, and to promote the spread of freedom and security.

The following is a list of the United States' primary objectives for these negotiations:

1. The complete and verifiable freeze (and eventual dismantling) of all aspects of the nuclear program in Iran. In the short term, this includes at a bare minimum compliance with the Additional Protocol as well as stopping uranium enrichment and construction of a heavy-water reactor. Iran has clearly violated the nonproliferation treaty and must be made an example of or further proliferation will occur. Make clear to Iran, the UK, France, Russia, and China that the United States supports a diplomatic solution to this problem, but if diplomacy is unproductive there are other ways to enforce treaty commitments. The use of the phrase "we will take no options off the table" is encouraged.
2. From the Russian delegation: Demand Russian support for economic sanctions against the government of Iran if the conference is unsuccessful. Assure the Russians that the New START treaty will be ratified shortly.
3. From the Israeli delegation: Obtain a promise that they will not take military action against Iran without our permission. Privately condemn their threats to do so. Publicly state that Israel has a right to defend its territory, and reestablish deterrence in the region.
4. From the French and UK delegations: Demand clear red lines for their negotiations with the Iranians, and obtain their backing for military action in the event that those red lines are crossed.
5. Demand that China, India, and Pakistan join the Proliferation Security Initiative. This will strengthen our ability to prevent further proliferation of nuclear weapons.

Secondary objective:

Secretary Of State Clinton informs me that the North Koreans are at the meeting. You must insist that they continue nuclear dismantlement in a timely fashion. Privately demand that all nuclear proliferation to the Middle East halt immediately.

In pursuing these objectives:

1. No mention of Israel's nuclear program
2. No criticism of India's nuclear program
3. No agreement by the US to any restraint on our ability to maintain a safe, secure, and effective nuclear deterrent.
4. For those who join the Proliferation Security Initiative – economic incentives.
