

Florida Early Voting Files

- Files are stored on a daily basis but in a complex format
 - 67 separate files
 - No pattern to the names
 - Individual file names are not an easily identified URL
- Downloading is a challenge: need to use a web "harvester" or "scraper."
- Where to start:
 - Florida Division of Elections URL
 - http://election.dos.state.fl.us/
 - Florida Early Voting Report URL
 - https://countyballotreports.elections.myflorida.com/ AbsenteeEarlyVotingReports/PublicReports

A Field Guide to the Website Harvest

- Files are listed by Election and grouped by county
- 67 x 3 separate files on this page
- File and variable documentation are at the top of the page
- Right click on an individual file to recover the URL



Identifying your prey

- The URL for the Alachua file is
 - https://countyballotreports.elections.myflorida.com/
 AbsenteeEarlyVotingReports/ViewReport?name=https%3A%2F
 %2Ffldos1fvrs.blob.core.windows.net%2Fcountyballotreport
 %2FALA EVL 9547 10302012 004800000

Wow!

- The final section of the URL starting with "ALA EVL" identifies this as the Alachua file
- The string that reads "10302012" identifies this as the November 2012 election file
- No regular pattern to the 10 characters at the end. This will make "batch" downloading a challenge
- You have 67 separate files to download!

Download options


Downloading 67 large files on a regular basis

- Download them manually. This is a job for an intern!
- 2. My advice: download them using a "batch" downloading program
 - Mac users: use SiteSucker (free software)
 http://sitesucker.us/home.html
 - Windows users: Teleport Pro is a low-priced option (there may be other free options). http://www.tenmax.com/teleport/pro/home.htm
- 3. Experts may be able to write download scripts or from other utilities*

^{*}Wget (Linux) or cURL (Mac OSX) can both recover files using the Florida URL but can't use wildcards. A 67 line script is not difficult to write but you need the list of three letter county codes as well as the nine-digit string at the end of the URL.


Sitesucker Example

- Using the \root early/absentee URL will download all the relevant files

- Sitesucker in operation on the Florida files:




Sitesucker Example (2)

The files will be stored in an unusual location.
 The other directories and files are not needed



SiteSucker (2)

 Files are given an HTML extension that needs to be replaced with TXT



Unix Gymnastics (Mac and Linux)

Step 1: rename all files with an ".html" extension to ".txt"

```
paulgronke$ for i in *.html; do mv "$i" "${i/.html}".txt; done
```

- Step 2: Make a subdirectory below the the "ViewReport" directory
- Step 3: Copy only the November 2012 files to the subdirectory. All 11/2012 files have a string identifying the date the file was created (in this cases, "10202012").

We can use this to copy the files to the subdirectory (this exact command only works if you are in a <u>subdirectory below</u> the directory where the early voting files are stored)

```
paulgronke$ find .. -name \*10302012\* -exec cp {} . \;
```

- NOTE: The string will change each day!

Finally ready for Stata

- The Stata Code linked here:
 - Issues a shell (Unix) command to creates a text file with the names of all individual Florida data file
 - Reads this file line by line as input into insheet commands
 - Appends the files one by one
 - Does some variable conversion and recoding
 - Collapses by date, summing up total Democratic,
 Republican, and Unaffiliated votes
 - Creates a simple bar chart

Commentary

- Florida does an excellent job making its early voting returns easily and cheaply available
- Process is still very complex and beyond the skills of experienced users
- If North Carolina is the best, and Florida is the second best, why is it so much harder (and expensive) in other states?
